Dress Code has become a HOT TOPIC here at Horizon. It is difficult to navigate the latest fashion with appropriate school dress.

Why is dress code important?

GESD believes appropriate dress leads to a positive community, supports an environment conducive to learning, and helps students achieve success in adult life.

What is the issue?

The HOT TOPIC here typically deals with Bottoms. Specifically jeans with holes and leggings.

Here is what our dress code says about Bottoms:

"Students may wear jeans or slacks. Shorts, skirts or skorts are expected to reach no more than four inches above the knee. Pants and shorts are to be worn at the waist and belts need to be worn if necessary to hold clothing in its proper position. Undergarments need to be covered including leggings and jeggings. Sweat pants may be worn, however, pajama bottoms are not acceptable."

So can I wear jeans with holes or not?

Jeans with holes are permitted but must still meet the requirements of shorts or skirts. That means that NO HOLES can be more than 4" above the knee.



What about leggings or jeggings?

Students may wear yoga pants, leggings or jeggings, provided they are worn with a long shirt or a skirt/short.

Let's be a team?

It is important that our students see us work as a team. Please support the school dress code with your child by reviewing the full dress code (p. 20 in your GESD parent and student handbook) and helping them to select clothes that both meet their fashion taste and the school dress code.

Kindergarten

Kindergartners are excited to be in school!! We are focusing on our rules and routines and starting our ABCs and 123s.

Second Grade

In Reading we will be working on mastering High Frequency Sight Words for quarter 1 and quarter 2. Spelling will consist of phonics rules that include digraphs, several consonant blends, endings like -ed (three separate sounds), endings -s and -ing, words with inconsistent but common spellingsound correspondences, and several patterns of long a, long e, and long o words. The ReadyGen resource Unit 2 will begin after Fall Break.

Math content will be focusing on telling time to the hour, half hour, quarter past the hour, and quarter til the hour. Working on the terms halves, thirds, and quarters will continue with dividing up shapes equally. By the end of Quarter 1, students will be able to add/subtract fluently within 50 using different strategies and apply to one-step word problems. Continuing to work on place value is a longterm standard for this month.

In Science, students will get to learn the characteristics of organisms and their life cycles.

In Social Studies, students will learn roles of citizenship in school, teamwork with students to achieve a common goal, and national symbols that are to be recognized.

Fourth Grade

October will be a quick and "easy month" for the fourth graders! We will be starting off the month reviewing for our benchmark exams which will be on the first Tuesday and Wednesday of October (3rd and 4th). In math we will continue on learning multi-digit multiplication and then jump right into division. In science we will be finishing up our science unit on plants and move on to learning about animals! In reading/writing we will be reading different texts and working on different reading comprehension skills and how to properly answer questions and work on our spelling and punctuation.

First Grade

First grade has some exciting learning heading our way. We will use pumpkins to explore life cycles, learn what living things need, do place value and read. We will learn to add and subtract to 20. We will learn about text features in informative texts and delve into learning about main events and central messages in narrative text. Hello October!

Third Grade

Third grade is busy working hard! We are close reading stories and focusing on how to support our answers with evidence from the text! We are jumping into informational texts and understanding that these types of readings teach us about facts and a certain topic.

We will also be going into expository and informational writing where we introduce and explain a topic. We are working on writing 5 paragraphs with nice and neat penmanship. We are noticing a lot of errors in not putting capitals at the beginning of sentences and messy handwriting!

In math we are moving on to division as we finished our chapter on multiplication last week.

In social studies we have been working on National Symbols of our nation! We will be taking a focus towards science and phases of the moon.

We are focused on building perseverance and trying our hardest. We are working on becoming independent workers and checking our work carefully to make sure we are putting our best work forward!

Fifth Grade

In 5th grade, we will spend our month of October learning to quote accurately from a text and theme in reading, and then write our opinions in different formats such as paragraphs. We are starting to learn about Early Americans and will continue our research in October. In math we are completing our decimal work which includes adding and subtracting decimals and then starting fraction operation work. In science we are continuing our learning of the Earth's Moon and how objects in space move.

Eighth Grade

The 8th grade students will be reading the Diary of Anne Frank while focusing on expository and narrative writing. In science, adaptations of animals and plants will be explored, as well as the overarching processes of evolution. Math will be continuing work with functions.

Sixth Grade

Our 6th graders are working very hard in their classes. We are inching closer to the end of the quarter with benchmark test taking place Oct. 3 and 4. Please have your child at school on those days. We will be setting up times for parent teacher conferences soon. Please be watching for your invitation.

Seventh Grade

Right now in 7th grade we are busy getting ready for our upcoming benchmarks. Both Reading and Math are reviewing critical standards.

In Writing and Social Studies, students are finishing up the American Civil War and spending next week learning about the Underground Railroad. We are writing personal narratives and creating poetry from the point of view of runaway slaves.

Students are finishing up our Science unit by creating models of lunar and solar eclipses.

The A-Team is happy with the progress the students are making. They are transitioning to the general education classrooms at a quick pace. We have the pleasure of welcoming a new student to Ms. Hanks' room. We are very appreciative of our Educational Assistants that are making transitions throughout the classrooms peaceful and tranquil.
