We are happy to inform you that your child has been granted a subscription to Rosetta Stone as an enrichment opportunity. The online subscription is active through June 30, 2020. Based on assessment data your child is currently identified as needing English Language Development. Rosetta Stone is an online program that helps students improve their English skills in speaking, listening, reading, and writing.

Accessing Rosetta Stone via Web or Mobile Device

To access the program at home via a district assigned Chromebook, students may go to <https://gesd4o.helloid.com/>, or use their schools website to access Single Sign-On. Students may be automatically logged in, if not they may enter their student ID as their username and gesd4o as their password. If your child has forgotten their student ID, please contact their teacher.

To access the program at home via a personal computer, students must sign in to your Rosetta Stone site URL at <https://gesd.rosettastoneclassroom.com/en-US> with their student ID as their username and gesd4o as their password.

To log in via mobile, they should download the Rosetta Stone Learn Languages app for their device and sign in with their username, password, and namespace (<https://gesd.rosettastoneclassroom.com/en-US>).

Best Practice Tips for Students Learning in a Home Environment

- Try to keep students to a schedule of activities while at home that aligns with their school schedule. For example, if they normally have language arts around 10 AM, try to keep that same time at home. Consistency matters.
- Create a learning space at home that is comfortable, but also represents what it is intended for.
- Practice language learning in the Foundations program in 20-30 minute increments, with shorter periods for younger students. Chunking out learning time helps with student focus and engagement.
- Practice reading [language stories](#) aloud together under Extended Learning.
- If you have access to a printer, flashcards and vocabulary cards can be printed and used for language games and additional practice.
- Most importantly, have fun!
